ULTRASOUND DETERMINATION OF RIBEYE AREA AND FAT THICKNESS FOR BREEDING CATTLE

Ultrasound techniques have been available for estimating carcass composition since the 1950's. Due to increased application of ultrasound in human hospitals, the technology and accuracy have improved dramatically since its early years. Since 1986, there has been a significant move by the Beef Industry to use ultrasound to determine composition of both live animals and carcasses.

Currently, the U.S. cattlemen have over 70 different breeds of cattle from which to choose animals for their breeding programs. Because of the competitive nature of the beef business, and of cattle breeders, breed associations must be aware of the demands of the beef industry in order to survive.

The Beef Industry has undergone dramatic changes in the past 30 years, and especially in the last 3-5 years. These changes are a result of consumer demands for less fat and more lean beef in their diets, plus, the economic pressure to produce cattle more efficiently.

With the advent of the National Consumer Retail Beef Study and increasing consumer trends to purchase only beef that is closely trimmed, there is a clear signal being sent down the marketing chain from packers and retailers to ranchers. The signal is: "Fat is OUT, lean is IN." In other words, the production of excess subcutaneous fat on beef is undesirable and the industry must strive to remove fat either by trimming or with genetics. Therefore, the future of the beef industry will depend on the ability to develop a more efficient production system through new and improved technology.

As packers become more aware of the value differences, live cattle prices may more truly reflect the value of retail products or the edible portions produced. Carcass information is needed, including fat subcutaneous thickness, ribeye area, carcass weight and marbling scores on cattle currently being supplied. Knowledge about current genetic programs and potential changes required to meet future beef preferences will enable beef producers to make decisions about breeding programs and production systems.

CATTLEMEN HOLD MIDYEAR CONFERENCE

More than 650 cattlemen gathered in Denver last week for the 1988 Midyear Conference of the National cattlemen's Association. In spite of the adverse effects of the drought in many areas, the mood of the cattlemen was generally upbeat.

The major purpose of the meeting was for committees to carry out preliminary and interim work on policy issues facing the industry. Official longer term policies will be established by the members at the 1989 convention in Phoenix, NCA president Dale Humphrey explained. Also, the NCA board met to handle association business matters and to act on interim policy matters.

Basic policy on drought relief legislation as it might affect the beef cattle business had been established previously, so there was no need for additional formal action. However, committee and board members reaffirmed positions on pending legislation. One was that feed help should go only to those who grow their own feed and not to those who are strictly feed purchasers (and have not had the input losses of drought area crop producers). Another was that drought legislation should not be used as a vehicle to raise dairy price supports—something which could contribute to another herd build-up and eventually a diversion or herd buy-out and extra cattle slaughter.

Packer concentration and integration were another issue discussed at the meeting. Humphrey said that additional information on this issue would be devel-

oped and that a special task force to look into the situation would be named soon.

Developments in cattle futures were outlined at committee and board meetings. Most of the cattle futures improvements negotiated between NCA and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange have been or will be completed. Work on development of a price index to use for the proposed cash settlement of fed cattle contracts continues. The task force will continue its work until the next annual meeting of NCA. A proposal in the cow-calf/stocker council to support a national producer referendum on cattle futures failed to win approval.

The NCA board voted to ask USDA to release Conservation Reserve Program land for grazing in emergency areas because of the drought. USDA earlier opened the land for a one-time haying. The board also directed a study on a buy-back proposal of federal set-aside acres.

Policy was adopted to exempt bull calves under 12 months of age from regulations requiring S branding of calves moving from Brucellosis infected herds and Class C states. Because of the confusion over traceability of slaughter cattle, the board voted to develop a total program of traceability and directed that NCA make a distinction between mandatory cattle identification and traceback in order to develop NCA policy

on traceability.

Three motions from the private lands committee were passed by the board. The motions were to support the presidential order of private property rights; to inform decision makers that the expansion of wetlands and the restrictions on land use advocated in a recent report are proposed without an accurate inventory of historical or current wetland acreage; and to compile research and data on the impact of water pollution on the beef industry.

Overseas market expansion continues to be an NCA priority, and the cattlemen discussed the Japanese-U.S. beef agreement as well as a need to break down barriers against U.S. beef which have been imposed by the Europeans.

Success on another top priority issue—positioning beef as healthful among agency personnel and other opinion leaders—was noted in connection with issuance of the Surgeon General's Report on Nutrition and Health. The report specifically recognizes the role of lean red meat in low-fat diets.

Closer trimming of beef by retailers is expected to change some of the criteria for beef labeling as regulated by the government. The NCA grading committee will have a special subcommittee look at the standards for "lean" and "lite" labeling of beef.

The major subject of meetings of the cow-calf/stocker, feeder and seedstock councils was value-based marketing—a system under which cattle would be paid for on the basis of the value of lean, quality meat rather than on the basis of averages and dressing percent. Kevin McCullough, business consultant, said that the change to such a system would be relatively slow and that a major transition would not occur until much of the packing industry was marketing pre-packaged, retail-ready branded beef—something which would require tighter specifications and which would cause packers/marketers to pay more precisely for animals with given quality and given amounts of mar-

ketable meat.

The board meeting included a report that NCA membership currently was 5,000 greater than a year earlier. Joint efforts with state affiliates to increase NCA membership continue. Each NCA board member is being challenged to personally go out and sign up 10 new members during the next three months.

The NCA Political Action Committee, which generates and distributes funds for Congressional election campaigns, has raised \$178,000 so far in the 1987-88 two-year election cycle. The goal is \$500,000. The committee is making campaign contributions in the 1988 Senate and House elections.
