# **FOUNDATION FACTS**

## **1990 FBA CONVENTION HAS RECORD ATTENDANCE**

The Yellow Rose of Texas adorned each member when the 19th Annual FBA Convention was called to order recently in San Antonio, Texas.

The business of the convention got underway with committee meetings on Thursday, November 8th. Once again this year, these meetings found all the committee members, as well as a number of non-committee members, taking an active role in the discussions.

A special "Meet The Candidates" Reception was held on Friday, November 9th. Hors d'oeuvres were served and all the candidates running for the board were introduced. In addition to meeting the candidates, this traditional gathering provided a wonderful opportunity for all the members to visit with other purebred FBA Beefmaster breeders.

A general membership meeting was called to order by President Gayle Evans on Saturday morning, November 10th. Following adoption of the minutes from the previous meeting, various committee reports were given.

In his President's Report, Gayle Evans spoke of the traveling he did during the year. Principally he traveled to various seminars and field days presented by the FBA satellites. He pointed out the continued success of the satellite program as well as the field days, forage tests and sales conducted by satellites. President Evans also addressed the good that NCA is doing for the beef industry.

In her report, FBA Executive Secretary, Mary Wilkinson, echoed President Evans' feeling regarding the success of both FBA and its nine satellite organizations. Mary reported that 1990 was a very busy year for the FBA office. In addition to the normal work load, the office has also handled record numbers of certificates, transfers and renditions. She pointed out that this increased level of activity emphasizes the strength and growth of the association.

Committee reports were given as were reports from each satellite.

Gayle Evans presented a number of membership awards in addition to a special membership award that was presented to Laurie Lasater.

Jimmy Owen, President of Texas & Southwest Cattle Raisers Association, was the keynote luncheon speaker. His subject, politics and government involvement in the cattleman's industry, commanded the undivided attention of his audience.

A five-member panel discussed Public/Private Land Use, Environmental Issues and Animal Welfare. Panelists were Sheila Massey, Director of Regulatory Affairs for the California Cattlemen's Association; Bob Rolston, Executive Secretary of the American Salers Association; H. Jay Platt, Attorney-at-Law; Bev Sparrowk, FBA Director; and O.C. Rampley, NCA Director. A lively question and answer session followed the panelists introductions.

One of the primary duties of the convention was the election of new board members. Newly elected to the Board of Directors were Watt M. Casey, DVM, TX; Jed Flake, AZ; Ron Freeman, IL; and O.C. Rampley, TX.

Following the general membership meeting, the new board held their first meeting and elected officers for the coming year. James Gowan, Montgomery, AL was elected as president.

Other elected officers are Bev Sparrowk, Clements, CA, Vice President; Danny Safrit, Concord, NC, Secretary; and Jay J. Flake, Snowflake, AZ, Treasurer.

Following the business meeting on Saturday, the entire group attended an "Oompah" dinner party.

The convention ended on Sunday with a bus tour of Walter & Joyce Campbell's Beefmaster Ranch at Blanco, Texas.

## PRIME TIME SHOOTOUT: NCA vs ROBBINS

It was like a shootout from the Old West recently when the cattle industry went head-to-head Oct. 25 with anti-meat activist John Robbins, author of *Diet For A New America*, and David Steinman, author of *Diet For A Poisoned Planet*. Each side drew and fired. Both got in some good shots. Standing up for the cowboys were NCA Vice President, Communications Kendal Frazier and Meat Board Vice President of Information Tom McDermott. The scene was the Seattle talk show *Town Meeting*. Panelists grilled each other, and the audience grilled them. At one point in the evening, in a remark which drew loud audience applause, Frazier read to the audience a Robbins' quote from *Yoga Journal* in which Robbins says he wrote his book after he was told to do so by a giant cow and a giant pig in a dream. "I don't think we should base discussions about agricultural production systems on dreams and vision," Frazier told the audience, McDermott hotly disputed Steinman's claim that meat is inherently unhealthy. "I think when we're talking about health problems, we're talking about fat. We don't want to produce it. We don't want it on our animals, and we're taking major steps to eliminate it," McDermott said. "Meat, yes; fat, no."

## GRAZING FEE SQUEAKS THROUGH AT \$1.81

First they raised it. Then they left it alone. After a hard-fought round of last-minute lobbying, cattlemen claimed victory when House and Senate conferees decided last week not to raise the grazing fee from \$1.81/AUM (animal unit month) to \$2. After a proposal to increase the fee to \$8.70 by 1994 passed the House by 96 votes, NCA, the Public Lands Council and the American Sheep Industry Association rallied a network of state associations and cattlemen's organizations to oppose Senate efforts to increase the fee. Grassroots lobbying successfully prevented a Senate vote on the issue, forcing the matter to go to a conference committee. In response to an urgent call for help from NCA, nine state organizations with key senators on the conference committee sent 11 livestock leaders to Washington, D.C., to lobby against the measure. Four cattlemen who stayed the entire two weeks to successfully lobby the conference who stayed the entire two weeks to successfully lobby the conference were NCA Public Lands Committee Chairman Bud Eppers, Public Lands Council Vice President Randall Brewer, Jack Metzger of Arizona and Dean Rhoads of Nevada.

## 'TIS THE SEASON FOR LESS BEEF DEMAND

As the holiday season approaches, watch for retailers to bolster their turkey supplies. That's bad news for beef. Retailers are expected to feature turkeys at prices ranging from 49 to 79 cents per pound, say industry analysts. This is significantly higher than last year when prices at some supermarkets dropped to as low as 19 cents per pound. The price strength for turkey is part of a continuing trend for all meats this year: total meat supplies are even with 1989, but prices for all meats have tracked higher than previous-year levels. Seasonally large supplies of pork and other competitive meats also will have an adverse affect on beef demand, says Cattle-Fax's Tommy Beall. However, he notes, fourth-quarter decreased beef demand typically coincides with seasonally low beef supplies, and 1990 is no different. Beall also noted that demand for fed cattle continues to be fairly strong and should increase in late December and hold steady through the first months of the coming year.

## LAST-MINUTE WINS FOR CATTLEMEN

In a season-ending frenzy of late night activity, the 101st Congress wrapped up its work Oct. 28, and went home to do some last-minute campaigning. Before congressmen left, they made final decisions on many issues important to the nation's cattlemen. Congress finally completed a deficit-reduction package and approved funds for the 1991 fiscal year; voted to keep the current grazing fee formula intact; passed the 1990 Farm Bill; and passed a bill revising nutrition labeling for many food products, not including meat and poultry. Congress ran out of time before considering many bills, which means those bills are now "dead". Those bills included: break-in legislation, which would make it a felony to vandalize animal research facilities, farms and ranches; fish inspection; the NCA-opposed Nebraska Wild and Scenic River bill; and legislation on commodity market regulation.

## DIETITIANS LEARN MORE ABOUT MEAT

More than 10,000 dietitians attended the 73rd annual meeting of the American Dietetic Association to learn about new ways to help patients establish healthier diets.

At a general session, "Responding to Consumer Needs: Contemporary Perspectives On Meat In The Diet," 375 of the dietitians learned about the new nutrient values and compositional figures for beef and pork. Food safety issues, consumption data, nutrition labeling and dietary counseling also were discussed.

Gary Smith, Ph.D., professor, department of animal sciences, Colorado State University, said, "People eat meat because they think its tastes good. It is, in fact, a nutrient-dense food because the cuts are leaner and well-trimmed."

Smith also asked those attending the seminar to help patients realize that there are no "good foods or bad foods," there are only "good diets and bad diets."

On the food safety front, Smith said perceptions are the food industry's greatest problem. "Once people learn about food safety, they realize the real threat is from germs and spoilage, not hormones, antibiotics or residues."

Although meat fits a healthy diet, raw consumption figures falsely give the impression that people are still overeating, according to Wendy Gregor, M.A., R.D., Meat

Board coordinator of allied health education. "Consumption figures are typically based on 'disappearance' values which grossly overestimates the amount of meat actually eaten."

Gregor also told the audience that changes in national food labeling were on the horizon. She informed them that the FDA and Congress were both working on labeling reform and new nutrition monitoring standards.

"Taking all this information and translating it into practical information for patients can be tough for any dietitian," said Gregor. "Decisions about meat should be made based on three considerations: serving size, the cut of meat and the cooking technique."

The Meat Board was accepted as a participant of the ADA annual meeting after submitting a proposal to be on the convention schedule. After ADA review, the request was granted.

In addition to sponsoring the seminar, the Meat Board participated in the ADA trade show. Health care education materials such as *Change of Plate*, *Nutrition Strategies*, and the *Iron In Human Nutrition* booklet were offered. More than 800 dietitians signed up for materials or additional information from the Meat Board.

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## Ranchers' Rights

- I. Ranchers have the right to care for their animals 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 52 weeks a year, for the rest of their lives. Without salary, overtime pay, pension plan, two-week vacations, medical insurance, retirement at 65, or any guarantee they will make a living from one year to the next.
- II. Ranchers have the right to spend all their money, including life savings, Christmas and vacation money, to feed their animals during droughts and bad winters. When they run out of money, they have the right to borrow more, regardless of the interest rate.
- III. Ranchers have the right to be kicked, stomped, knocked down, exhausted, frustrated and impoverished by their animals, without retaliating in any way, except cussing. Softly, so they don't upset their animals.
- IV. Ranchers have the right to treat their animals for every minor injury and illness; while ignoring their own bruises, sprains, swelling, cuts, scrapes and loose teeth acquired while caring for their animals.
- V. Ranchers have the right to cancel family outings, vacations, anniversaries and birthday parties, at a moment's notice, in order to solve some last-minute ranch crisis.
- VI. Ranchers have the right to put the health and well-being of their animals above everything else, including their own health, wealth and well-being, while still taking time to worry about the real problems of the world: poverty, hunger, war, crime and fanatics.
- VII. Ranchers have the right to make sure their animals are fed and watered 24 hours a day - no matter how hot, cold, wet or miserable the weather - before they get to eat or sleep themselves.
- VIII. Ranchers have the right to lose their ranch, their home, their health and even their loved ones by spending all their time, money and love on their animals.
- IX. Ranchers have the right to the special satisfaction that comes from providing a valuable service to society and devoting their lives to caring for their land and livestock.
- X. Ranchers have the right to ranch. And for every uninformed animal-rights kook, a thousand people would love to have that right.
