Federal Lands Legal Foundation

We are in a war. It is being fought right here in the American West. This war pits those people who -- cloaked in the mantle of conservation and environmentalism -- place owls, wolves, fish, and even weeds over people.

We, the People, are losing battle after battle and if we don't fight back we are going to lose the war. With that defeat will go our freedom, our land, and all that our forefathers worked and died for when they carved a civilization out of the wilderness.

This war began in 1973, shortly after Congress passed the Federal Endangered Species Act.

Eastern interests, like The Nature Conservancy, who hope to turn our Western states into the playground of wealthy Easterners, cunningly twisted the Act to their own ends.

The Nature Conservancy is buying up private lands at the astounding rate of 1,000 acres a day, taking them off the tax rolls of counties and school districts throughout America, but especially here in the West.

By deftly using federal laws and most particularly, rulings by federal agency heads back East, this one particular organization is taking tax-producing land out of private hands and funneling it into federal ownership where it forever remains off local tax rolls.

What many well-meaning contributors to the Nature Conservancy don't know is that the organization doesn't necessarily give land donated to it to the federal government, but sells it to the government -- at a profit!

In addition, this group and its allies have gotten the bureaucrats in the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; Bureau of Land Management; U.S. Forest Service and National Park Service to control the use of private property through misrepresentation of the Endangered Species Act.

Washington-based lawyers for these agencies, with moral and legal support from their fellow lawyers on the staffs of the alleged "environmental" groups, invariably interpret the 1973 Act to the detriment of private landowners and ranchers and farmers who use public lands throughout the Western states.

They churn out hundreds of directives and thousands of memoranda directly how private and public lands can be used by the very people who either own them or pay fees to use them.

Unless successfully challenged in the courts, these directives and memoranda have the force of law, taking the use of private and public lands out of the hands of farmers and ranchers.

The fact that these same lands produce America's food and energy is of no concern to the supporters of these private groups and government agencies who put the well-being of pests and predators ahead of the rights of people.

A case in point is currently going on in Fort Davis, Texas on the little Aquia Creek.

For more than 100 years ranchers have been grazing their cattle along the banks of Little Aquia with no apparent effect on

the surrounding flora or fauna.

Now, mis-using the Endangered Species Act, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is threatening to forbid the grazing of cattle on the private lands through which the little Aquia flows.

Their reason? They say the cattle suddenly are trampling the Pond Weed and maybe affecting the quality of the water. The bureaucrats even admit to trespassing on private land to obtain their flimsy "evidence."

There doesn't seem to be an end to the asinine decisions such as that made on Little Aquia Creek. This is a war of bureaucrats running amok.

But this war can be won. With your help we can turn the tide of the battle. The way to do this is to fight where it counts -- in the Federal courthouse throughout the West and, need be, even in the U.S. Supreme Court itself.

Because these moronic memos and asinine administrative orders remain in force until they are overturned in the courts, it is in the courts that this war must be waged.

That's why a group of your fellow Westerners -- farmers, ranchers and others who, like you have a vested interest in the future of private lands and the proper use of public lands -- have formed a vibrant new non-profit organization.

It's called the Federal Lands Legal Foundation (FLLF) and it was founded to fight the federal bureaucrats and their unrealistic and un-American policies and to fight them in the legal arena.

The FLLF is not a lobbying organization. It is a fighting organization.

But it needs your financial support if it is to stop the pillaging of private lands throughout the American West.

If ranchers and farmers would contribute just 5 cents for each of their acres to the FLLF then we, the people of the land, would be victorious.

Your 5-cent-an acre contribution will go a long way to help pay for the top legal talent who will remove the government roadblocks that are making it impossible for farmers and ranchers to productively use private and public lands for the good of all Americans.

The 8th Annual Heart of America Beefmaster Breeders Seminar was held Sept. 21, 1991 at Roy and Tanya Schoenbeck's Ranch, Bourbon, Missouri with approximately 275 in attendance. Roy began by welcoming everyone and Mary Wilkinson, Exec. Sec., gave a brief summary of the philosophy of the Beefmaster breed.

James R. Gowan, FBA President, spoke of the history of the Beefmaster breed. He pointed out the integrity of the breeder and how that makes FBA breeders special -- get to know the breeder personally.

After a delicious lunch, Ron Freeman, FBA Director and HOA President discussed the environmental issues facing us and the direct effects they will have on us as cattlemen. As O.C. Rampley told us a year ago, these issues will not go away. We, as cattlemen, need to voice our thoughts. One issue that will no doubt come up again is the recent measure sponsored by Rep. Mike Synar (D-Okla.) to raise grazing fees on public land from \$1.97 per animal per month to \$8.70. This would literally put a large number of western cattlemen out of business and towns will become ghost towns.

Dr. G. Scott Middleton, Worthington, Ohio followed explaining Beefmasters to be the most honest breed of cattle today. He discussed the six essentials and how the Lasater Ranch gives them practical application and how each of us as breeders can put them to use and make them work for us. There are no fancy formulas.

Dr. Middleton also explained the myth behind cholesterol and the fallacies behind some of the studies. Beef is an important element in nutrition and in keeping the body healthy.

The seminar ended with a leap of joy when Nicholas Anderson's name was drawn to receive the free Beefmaster Bull. His mother, Joyce Ladany jumped over six rolls of straw bales to reach the announcer. They chose a bull brought by Paul Squires, Hawk Point, Missouri. Nicholas Anderson is from Bourbon, Missouri.

NCA and KLA Oppose Z-Bar Prairie Park

The House Interior Committee last week passed HR 2369, a measure that would establish the Flint Hills Prairie National Monument on the 11,000-acre Z-Bar Ranch in Chase County, Kan. NCA and the Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) oppose the measure out of concern the park would continue to grow and affect rights of adjacent ranches, according to Mike Beam of KLA. During last week's committee hearing, Rep. Bruce Vento (D-Minn.), chairman of the House National Parks and Public Lands Subcommittee, said he sees his subcommittee continuing to seek expansion of a tallgrass prairie park. Ironically, the U.S. Park Service also opposes the measure, contending that "the proposed unit is neither large enough to ensure successful management as a tallgrass prairie ecosystem nor has there been a determination of its degree of natural or cultural significance.

Cattle Producers: On The Cover Again

The Sept. 30 issue of *Newsweek* contains yet another article about cattle on western ranges and the alleged destruction they cause. An environmentalist quoted in the article claims, "The image of the land-sensitive cowboy is just a lie. They've assaulted the entire system of nature," and another article sources suggest that taxpayers have underwritten damage with grazing allotments amounting to subsidies and cowboy welfare. How are ranchers getting this government help? According to the article, "Modern ranchers cling to the Marlboro-man image of indefatigable individualism, the howl when federal subsidies are threatened." But as the article points out ranchers are just one of the groups under fire in the West "as affluent vacationers and second-home owners are importing new, frequently unwelcome, standards of environmental correctness to the wilderness."

Symposium Seeks Balance On Range

A balance between livestock production and wildlife management was promoted recently during a livestock and big game symposium in Sparks, Nev. The symposium, which dealt with western rangelands, was a cooperative effort between the U.S. Forest Service and livestock producers, says NCA Public

Lands Committee Chairman Jim Connelley of Mountain City, Nev., who helped organize the symposium. NCA First Vice President Jimmie Wilson of Trout Creek, Mont. spoke during the conference pointing out that "the grass which livestock consume is a renewable resource which is transformed into food which is used to sustain life on this planet." Wildlife management concerns affecting livestock producers include control of brucellosis and tuberculosis in elk, bison and other big game herds, and predator control.

Oregon Has New Sign Of The Times

The new no-trespassing sign designed by the Private Lands Committee of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association (OCA) informs trespassers that there is no entry without written permission into private, natural-resource-management areas. The durable yellow signs can be ordered by calling OCA at 503/238-7400.

Lawsuits Challenge BLM, Forest Service

The Federal Lands Legal Foundation recently filed two law-suits against the federal government challenging federal land management policies. In the first suit, the Foundation alleges that the U.S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management have failed to issue rules and regulations describing processes for implementing grazing-allotment management plans. The suit, filed in the federal district court in Albuquerque, N.M. requests that a judge order both agencies to write rules and regulations governing grazing-allotment plan development under provisions of the Public Rangelands Improvement Act. The second suit was a "takings" lawsuit filed in the U.S. Claims Court in Washington, D.C., against the U.S. Forest Service. Nevada ranchers Wayne and Jean Hage are seeking monetary damages primarily for the taking and loss of use of water on federal land where the rights to that water are owned by ranchers and for additional economic woes which arose from the taking of the water.

Isa bulls bring top prices in Angelo sale

Buyers from Florida to California and from several states in the Republic of Mexico paid top dollar here Saturday for 276 bulls offered at the annual fall Isa Cattle Company fall sale held at Producers livestock Auction.

The 276 bulls brought a total of \$631,500, and averaged \$2,228.04 per head. The 213 spring bulls offered in the sale averaged \$2,482.16, and the 63 fall bulls sold for an average of \$1,631.75 per head.

During the two days of sales of bulls and females at the first annual Beefmaster Fiesta, buyers purchased

\$1,056,900-worth of cattle, auction figures revealed.

The top selling bull, raised by the George Denny Cattle Co. of Boston, Mass. brought \$7,100 and went to the Trueheart Ranch of Houston.

Juan Diaz of Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico, bought several other top selling bulls, including the second high seller for \$6,500. The Mexican cattleman also was top volume buyer both days, paying \$101,500 for 32 bulls on Saturday and 27 pairs of cows and calves and 52 bred
