## What's Wrong With This Picture?



Many would say the color of the hide is unacceptable. Others would say perhaps he lacks in the right Beefmaster characteristics ... maybe it's because he's a natural poll. Or is his sheath too tight?

Matter of fact, there's nothing wrong as far as his managers are concerned. This bull weaned second heaviest in the herd, grew well during feed test, had a scrotal circ. of 44.5 cm . as a yearling and had a pelvic area much above average. His dam was a 2 -year-old and he was sired by a yearling bull.

Some are constantly tempted to extend the six essentials. Two of the most prevalent ideas are the color and selection for polled. Both of each have very little economic value and would drastically reduce the number of individuals from which to select.

What are Beefmaster characteristics? For us they are continually being defined. Many times we get caught up
in what our buyers feel is best, when in fact we must be mostly concerned with what works for us. Perhaps the middle ground is where we need to head.

If you can imagine, we have neighbors with other breeds of cattle who, year after year, help the same cows nurse their newborn because "they're my best cows."

My question is, "Surely you don't keep their heifer calves for replacements?"

What I consider one of Mr. Lasater's more meaningful opinions is we must decide what criteria we want our cattle to possess, and then go after it. What kind of looks the good Lord gives them to excel in that area is up to him and is of no consequence. It is our desire to stay as close to the Lasater Philosophy as our environment will allow.

Back to what's wrong with the picture ... we haven't had rain in eight months.

## The Beefinaster Story

T.he production of Beefmasters takes a functional approach in the cattle industry, since it is the only recognized breed of cattle in existence that has been selected solely for beef-making characteristics. The primary goal was to produce a large quantity of good beef that required the least in cost, care and attention.

Beefmasters are an exceptionally hardy and meaty animal, produced at a realistically low cost and sold at a realistically high price. The breed has gained acceptance throughout the beef-producing states and abroad.

Tom Lasater began to develop the Beefmaster in the early 1930s Some of the concepts he used to create the breed go back to the early 1900 s. In those years, some of the breeding and management policies behind the development of today's

## Beefmasters were begun by Edward

C. Lasater, Tom's father.

The breeding and management program followed by the Lasater Ranch is based on one of nature's oldest laws: the survival of the fittest. The Lasater concept of this natural law is intelligently applied through selection for six essential characteristics that have been stressed in the development of the Beefmaster breed. These characteristics are disposition, fertility, weight, conformation, hardiness and milk production. They are all equally important traits, according to Tom Lasater.
"You could develop any five of those six essentials to perfection and, without the one you left out, whichever one it is, that animal would have no value as a breeding animal," Lasater said.

The importance of disposition is obvious. Any rancher can improve his herd by selecting cattle with good dispositions. They pay off on the ranch and in the feedlot. Gentle cattle are easier and cheaper to handle, make better gains and bring better prices. Nervous, unruly cattle do not gain well and cause cowmen trouble and expense. High-strung, temperamental females have more

difficulties breeding and calving. Beefmasters have been managed and selected for disposition; they are gentle, intelligent and responsive.

Fertility, from an economic standpoint, is the most important trait to consider when selecting beef cattle. An unproductive animal is an expense to its owner.

Weight is an important factor because the more an animal weighs at market time, the more profit he turns for the breeder. Beefmasters weigh more where it matters: on the hook and on the platter.

Conformation, in Beefmasters, simply means the carcass will yield the most pounds of lean, tender beef per pound of live weight. The more pounds of the more desired cuts of beef the animal produces, the more the breeder and packer make.

Hardiness is the hallmark of the Beefmaster breed. Hardy cattle are animals with the ability to stay healthy and productive on the range
under various climatic conditions, with little assistance from man. Beefmasters have proven themselves under varied harsh conditions.

In selections for milk production, the emphasis is placed on a cow's milking abilities. More milk means heavier calves at weaning. The Beefmaster cow must suckle her calf and maintain her own body vigor under range conditions until weaning time.

The six Beefmaster essentials represent a practical and profitable standard for use in efficient beef production. To disregard or overlook any one of the essentials is to risk the loss of maximum beef production. Concentrating on such non-essentials as hide color merely complicates the breeding program without adding any real value to the animal.

The Lasater Ranch practices a multi-sire system of breeding. The Lasaters have worked to convert
other breeders to the multi-sire system of breeding because they believe it is a superior method of developing an improved strain of beef cattle.

Tom Lasater patented the Beefmaster name in 1949, and developed the Name Franchise Contract in order to control unauthorized and indiscriminate use of the Beefmaster name. The prefix name becomes the sole property of the first breeder authorized to use it. Thus, there are "Lasater Beefmasters," etc. The prefix name places responsibility for the quality of each individual herd on each individual breeder.

In 1954, the Beefmaster was recognized as an American breed by the United States Department of Agriculture. Beefmasters are the only three-way cross cattle recognized as an American breed.

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# Lasater. Still The Foremost Beefmaster Breeder

$\square$om Lasater is one of the foremost cattle breeders in the world, and one of those rare individuals who has made a lasting impact on the cattle business. But he is and always has been a maverick. His
ranch today, under the management of his son, continues that tradition.

Tom was born in Texas and raised on his father's 400,000-acre ranch near Falfurrias. His grandfather had been ranching in south Texas since 1882. Before losing most of what his family owned in the Depression, Tom's father Ed Lasater had built up reputation herds of Brahman cattle and good milking Herefords. When Ed died in 1931, Tom came home from college at Princeton to take over management of what was left of the family's ranch.

A few of the good Brahmans and some Herefords remained. At that point, Tom brought in some outstanding Shorthorn bulls and mated them to both the Brahmans and the Herefords. Later, when faced with a bull shortage, he bred the Brahman/Hereford crosses to the Brahman/Shorthorn
crosses. Tom could tell just by looking at his cattle that the three-way cross animals were vastly superior to their two-way parents, so he closed his herd in 1937 and continued breeding the 1/2 Brahman and 1/4 Hereford and Shorthorn cattle. In 1954, the USDA officially recognized the cattle Tom had been breeding as a distinct breed of American cattle.

Tom Lasater's ideas were thought eccentric at first. Well, that is being too kind ... many thought he was just plain crazy! Tom believed in multiple-sire herds from the beginning; he maintained only nature should make the choice as to which bull should breed each cow.
"I like to sit back and let nature do the work. She's a hell of a lot smarter than we are," he once told a writer for the Sierra Club.

From the beginning, Tom thought breeding animals should be selected solely on their functional ability -- not on how many ribbons they won in the show

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ring. Whether it be coyotes or cattle, he has always believed in survival of the fittest. Any animal that wanders away from her calf at birth or does not bring a calf to the weaning pen is culled. That is for any reason, including lightning strike.
"If you make excuses for your cows for one reason, pretty soon you'll be forgiving them for other reasons," Tom explained.

Lasater Beefmasters are dog gentle and have been bred for disposition, fertility, weight, conformation, hardiness and milk production ... characteristics that have now become Lasater's famous six essentials.

When land values began to skyrocket in the 1940s, making expansion difficult, Tom looked around for a new location. He found the high and dry country around Matheson, Co., appealing, and in 1948 bought the first land
he had ever owned - a 28,500 -acre ranch. Tom paid for the ranch with cash from cattle; he claims the Beefmasters have made money every year since 1932. In 1950, Tom brought his entire family to the new home of the Beefmasters. He is fond of saying, "We just came up for the summer and forgot to go back home." His wife, Mary, was a partner in the Lasater Ranch until her death in 1980 .

Tom Lasater literally put the tiny town of Matheson on the map. With a population of less than 100 citizens, this town 50 miles northeast of Colorado

We have added two more former Watt Casey herd sires to our Casey and Lasateroriginated herd.

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Plan. Interested buyers send in a bull contract with a deposit prior to the bull sale date. A drawing sets the order in which the bulls are chosen. Buyers come from throughout the world for a random drawing that will determine their future breeding programs.

Tom still makes his home on the ranch in Matheson, with Pikes Peak framing the western boundary and the rolling prairie and grassland stretching to the east for 12 miles along the Big Sandy Creek. One thousand mother cows run on the initial 28,000 acres, and an additional 30,000 acres have been added in southeastern Colorado.

After spending 55 years developing his herd, Tom has turned the day-to-day management over to his son, Dale. The ranch is owned in a family partnership between Tom and his six children, Laurie, Dale, Lane, Sally, Alan and Brian.

After graduating from Princeton University, Dale received a Fulbright Scholarship to the University of Buenos Aires. He spent two years with the Peace Corps on cattle improvement programs in Colombia, and then several more years in feedyard management in Kansas before returning to the family ranch.

In 1984, Dale had the good fortune of hearing a talk presented by Allan Savory in Albuquerque, NM. Dale realized his father had already been practicing much of what Savory was preaching. Tom has never allowed hunting, trapping or poisoning of predators on his land, including coyotes, prairie dogs and rattlesnakes.
"The ranch operates as a wildlife sanctuary," Dale explained, "protecting all wildlife, including predators and rodents commonly referred to as pests."

In addition, there is no artificial seeding of rangeland and no

use of chemicals for weed control. Goats are used to control the leafy spurge on creek banks. Lasater cattle are only vaccinated for Blackleg and the heifers are Bangs-vaccinated.
"We let Mother Nature do most of the work," Tom and Dale have said.

After the Albuquerque experience, Dale went home and began practicing Holistic Resource Management on the Lasater Ranch, as outlined by Savory. With traditional pastures now subdivided by electric fencing, the cattle are moved more frequently, allowing longer rest periods and complete recovery on grazed areas.
"Using a three-part goal, the ranch is trying to optimize cattle production while paying particular attention to the long-term health of the land, as illustrated by such things as ground cover and diversity of species," Dale explained. "We were used to driving out in the pickup or riding out on horseback, looking across a pasture horizontally and seeing what looks like a lot of grass. The first thing you learn to do with HRM is look straight down to the ground. When you see bare ground between grass plants, the goal is to get it grassed over." For his efforts, Dale and the Lasater Ranch were given the Leonard Horn Range Livestockman of the Year Award by the Colorado Cattlemen's Association in 1989.

Like his father, Dale Lasater is a forward-thinking individual. He is a past president of the Pikes Peak Cattlemen's Association, and former director of the Texas Cattle Feeders and the National Cattlemen's Association.
"My greatest concern in looking to the future is that in defending our industry from various attacks, we will lose the ability to recognize our own past errors ... such as the evils of continuous grazing," Dale said. "We need to increase our understanding of the natural world in which we operate. In addition, it is essential to our survival that we stop responding mechanically to each new 'problem,' whether it be brush, noxious weeds or

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predators. We need to begin to understand the 'ecosystem' processes that control the destiny of this land we inhabit."

Many people thought Tom Lasater was crazy when he initiated the basis for what was to become an accepted method of raising beef cattle and the very popular Beefmaster breed. Today, many reading the preceding comments may think Dale Lasater, too, has gone a little overboard in his thinking. But over time, Tom Lasater was proven right and his name became legend in our industry. One gets the feeling Dale Lasater's deeply held convictions will also one day become common practice.

The diversity of grasses that wave in the Colorado wind, and the wildlife that have made the Lasater Ranch their home, are living proof: The Lasater legend lives on.

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With the start of a new decade as a time of expansion and stability, the Central Texas Beefmaster Breeders are optimistic about the opportunities available to seedstock and commercial beef cattle producers.

The Beef "On" Forage Test \& Sale has taken an innovative approach to developing breeding age bulls, with no preferential pampering, by growing and per-formance-testing their top end bulls on a 300-day forage program. They are tested under the guidelines of the Texas Forage and Grassland Council Forage Bull Development Program.

The purpose of this test is to identify those bulls having a superior genetic ability to convert forage to beef by comparing contemporaries within an age
and breed group in a uniform grazing environment.

The bulls entered in this program are within 90 days of age of each other and will average 22 months at sale time. Each bull will sell with complete performance evaluation, including adjusted 205-day weaning weights, gain weights, yearling weights, weight per day of age, ratios, ultrasound ribeye measurements and scrotal circumference.

This year's test includes $\mathbf{1 6 0}$ top end bulls from 30 consignors that will sell October 15, 1994, in Brenham, Tx., in our 8th Annual Beef "On" Forage Sale.

## Beefmaster Cattle Flourish In Any Climate

Those Beefmasters Do Just Fine In Cold Weather

Jack and Joy Fullenwider look after a lot of cattle in the middle of a lot of country. They actually operate three ranches. The home place is Eden Valley Ranch, located 35 miles northeast of Winnemucca, Nv. That's north central Nevada, and cold country in the winter. Jack said the temperature can go down to 15 degrees below zero and stay that way for a good, long while. The Fullenwiders also have two other places, where they summer up to 2,500 pairs.

The home ranch alone is enough to keep most people pretty busy. Yack has 400 mother cows on over

1,100 square miles of country. In fact, that's one reason why he decided to start using Beefmaster bulls on his mostly Angus cows.
"We have not had any calving problems, and that's important to us," Jack explained. "We calve year-round, so when we turn them out, they have to pretty much take care of themselves. We definitely don't pamper our cattle.
"I like the Beefmasters because they are good, hardy cattle. I also
like their size. We sell the heifers we don't keep, and our steers, as yearlings. The Beefmaster cross
yearlings are much bigger."

Jack said the thing he likes most about his
Beefmasters is their marketability.
"The feedlots like the way these cattle perform. We deal with several of them in Colorado and Nebraska, and they buy everything I can raise just about as fast as I can raise it."

As for using Beefmaster cattle in cold country, Jack is satisfied.

"We have not had any problem at all. They do just fine. In fact, they're better than a lot of other breeds I know about."

Greater marketability, greater size and hardy cattle that take care of themselves and "do just fine" in cold weather. If a man says those kinds of things about his cattle, they must be pretty good.

Cold Weather Doesn't Bother Hank Filippini's Beefmasters

Hank Filippini, his wife Marian and his daughter and son-in-law, Angie and Shawn Mariluch, raise a big bunch of Beefmasters on a big bunch of country. Their cow/calf operation runs about 1,200 cows on over a half million acres 20 miles south of Battle Mountain, Nv. Hank's other daughter Jill, and her husband Bert Paris, also use Beefmaster cattle on their nearby ranch.

This is high, windy, dry desert country, and it can get cold in the winter. It's common to see the temperature drop down to 10 or 15 degrees below zero and stay there
for awhile. Even though it is unusual, a couple of years ago it dropped to 40 degrees below for two straight weeks. Through all these cold "droughty" conditions, the

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Filippini's Beefmaster cattle do well.
"We've had a drought for the last seven years, but the Beefmasters are still on the gain and goin'," Hank
commented. "They are really hardy cattle."

A number of years ago, Hank was having some herd problems.

"We select the replacement heifers we want to keep, and sell the rest of our heifers and steers as yearlings," he explained. "But our bulls kept getting smaller and smaller. As they went down in size, so did my yearlings. I had seen these Beefmasters before. I liked the looks of the cattle, so we bought a couple of bulls and put them on our Hereford cows. We saw a big difference with our very first cross. The calves were a lot heavier, they did better and we had no calving problems.
"Today, all our cattle are bigger. Our cows are bigger, our bulls are

bigger and, most of all, the yearlings we take to market are bigger."

In Hank's case, it's more than just size. He also feels the quality of his herd has improved.
"They're just nicer cattle. This year, all of my heifers are good -- I'd like to keep every one of them. Also, I've been told I've got the best bunch of steers in the state of Nevada. I don't know about that, but I do know this for sure: I've never had any trouble selling my cattle. There are always lots of buyers for them."

The Filippinis are taking heavier yearlings to a market where buyers are waiting to write the check. As far as Hank is concerned, that's the bottom line.

Mannix Ranch, Avon, Montana

Irancis Mannix runs his cattle operation near Avon, Mt., about 45 miles northwest
of Helena. He is in high mountain country, only 30 miles from the Continental Divide.

Francis starts calving around mid-March. He holds his calves for sale until they are yearlings, and his yearling weights average a little better than $1,000 \mathrm{lbs}$. Each year he holds back about 50 replacement heifers.
"We've had no calving problems," Francis said of his Beefmaster cross heifers. "Last year we had 52 bred heifers and only lost one calf."

Francis started with a Hereford herd over 30 years ago.
"In that time, I've tried just about every kind of bull there is.

fine. That's a lot of cold, but those Beefmasters are a lot of animal."

## Webb Ranch, Jerome, Idaho

Kirk Webb, along with his brother Todd and his dad Tom, run a commer cial cow/calf operation near Jerome Id. That's right next-door to the famous Sun Valley ski area, and that's cold country.

The Webbs started using Beefmaster bulls on their cows several years ago.

## A Plan For Profit manamace The Beefmaster Breed Unique?

There are three points that make the Beefmaster breed unique and different from other breeds.

1. The Beefmaster has evolved from a three-way crossbreeding program. The three-way hybrid proved to be far more functional than a two-way hybrid.
2. Beefmaster is the only breed that, from its inception, has been selected solely for beef-making characteristics. Since 1937, the foundation herd of the Beefmaster breed has been closed and selection for sires and replacement females has come from within the herd.
3. Beefmaster animals have been selected for only six characteristics: fertility, weight, milking ability, disposition, hardiness and conformation. These characteristics have become known as the six essentials.

Unlike other Brahman hybrids, a Beefmaster cannot be recreated today. All Beefmasters are purebred descendents of Tom Lasater's foundation herd, or are produced by at least three consecutive crosses using certified Beefmaster bulls.

Weaning and yearling weights in the Beefmaster breed increase for two reasons. First, Beefmasters have been selected for heavy weaning and yearling weights - weight being one of the six essential characteristics. Due to years of selection for weight, a Beefmaster bull's own gaining ability can be predictably transferred to his offspring.

Second, breeding Beefmaster bulls to your cows will maximize hybrid vigor. This results from the fact that no other breed is closely related to the Beefmaster today, and the more distantly related two parents are, the greater the effects of hybrid vigor in the offspring.

Beefmasters have been selected for fertility. This is carried beyond conception figures to include the ability to calve unassisted at two years of age. To accomplish this difficult task, nature has designed the Beefmaster calf to be relatively small at
birth and tubular in shape. Newborn calves look like wet jack rabbits - all legs and ears. Beefmaster bulls are prepotent; the size and shape factors will be evident even in first cross calves.

With the demand for leaner beef, buyers do not discriminate against fast-growing, high-yielding

Beefmaster steers. In many areas they bring a premium because feedlot operators know they will convert feed efficiently and have a yield grade two carcass -- just the kind demanded by packers.

Keep your heifer calves as replacements. The basic Beefmaster characteristics of fertility and milking ability,

plus the added production boost from hybrid vigor, will make these first cross females excellent brood cows.

Slow maturing rates may or may not be characteristic in Brahman hybrids, but in the foundation herd and most other Beefmaster herds, both bulls and heifers are bred as yearlings, with heifers dropping calves at two years of age. This has been the case for many years, so there has been long-
term, selective pressure on the breed to reach early sexual maturity. Beefmaster bulls will pass this characteristic on to their crossbred progeny.

Beefmasters originated on the Gulf Coast of Texas, and over the years have been accepted throughout the hot, humid Southeast. The foundation herd has been on Colorado's eastern slope since 1949. Other major breeders also have herds throughout the

## Applying for Membership

Each person who wishes to join the Foundation Beefmaster Association is required to complete and sign an application for active membership and/or an application for upgrading membership. An FBA name franchise contract and an FBA inventory form also must be completed. These forms are available from the FBA office in Denver, and we would be most happy to help you in their completion.

## Types of Membership

Applicants who own one or more Beefmaster cattle are eligible for active membership and entitled to all the services of the association, including voting and the right to hold office. Applicants who own no Beefmaster cattle but do own one or more first or second cross Beefmaster females are eligible for an upgrading membership, and thus entitled to all services of the association. They are not, however, entitled to vote or hold office. All membership applications are subject to approval by the board of directors.

FBA rules on upgrading are very simple. The FBA recognizes the third consecutive cross to recognized Beefmaster bulls as a Beefmaster. All record-keeping is

## .

strictly up to the breeder and his own personal integrity; no association inspections are made.

First and second cross females are to be counted and a rendition of dues made to the association. When a breeder reaches the third consecutive cross to recognized breeding, he is to apply for regular membership. The third cross animals are recognized as Beefmasters and dues should be paid on them as Beefmasters. Certificates of Breeding are available on first and second cross females, if wanted by the breeder.

From time to time, the board of directors may, at their sole discretion, make an Associate, Junior or Honorary Membership available to selected individuals.

## The Name Franchise Contract

It is inevitable that the characteristics of a herd of cattle will be influenced by the herd's management and environment. The result (as in all

ASSOCIATION." breeds) is not all Beefmaster herds are alike, except that they descended from the same source.

It was determined some years ago that responsibility for the traits of an individual herd ought to be placed on the breeder -- not the breed or association. To this end, a system of
prefix names was devised.
Each breeder uses a first name for his herd. The most common choice is the breeder's surname. Ranch names or brands are also often used. The breeder may select any prefix name that does not duplicate that of any other breeder or tend to mislead the public as to the identity of his herd.

The association coordinates the assignment of prefix names with other Beefmaster associations. If an applicant chooses a prefix name that is the same as or very similar to one in use, he will be asked to select another. Prefix names must be approved by the board of directors.

## Inventory Fees

Membership dues are based on the number of Beefmasters owned by the member. Therefore, the bylaws require a true inventory of all Beefmaster cattle and all female Beefmaster crosses owned (except calves) be counted or rendered at the time of joining, and each January thereafter.

Please note: 100 percent of the Beefmasters and female crosses owned are to be rendered, whether they have certificates or not and regardless of which association may have issued any of the certificates.

1. Obtain a book of Applications for Certificates of Breeding from the association office.
2. Fill out the application completely and sign it.
3. Send the application and appropriate fee for each certificate applied for to the association office.
4. Sign in the designated place on the face of the certificate when it is issued.

To transfer a Certificate of Breeding:
(The first transfer must be signed by the member who applied for the certificate and signed the face of the certificate.)

1. Complete and sign the transfer form on the back of the certificate.
2. Send the certificate and the proper amount to the association office.

To obtain a duplicate of a Certificate of Breeding that has been lost or destroyed:

1. Obtain an Application for Duplicate Certificates of Breeding.
2. Complete and sign the application, and send it and the proper amount per duplicate applied for, to the association office.

## Certificates of Breeding

The FBA does not require a Certificate of Breeding on any animal. All certificates are voluntary on the part of the breeder.

From time to time, any breeder may need papers on his cattle. As an example, papers are required when sending cattle to other countries or entering them in Extension Service testing programs.

The Foundation Beefmaster Association's system of Certificates of Breeding is designed to be as simple as possible, and still meet the breeder's needs. Responsibility for the animal's being as described rests wholly on the breeder. The association takes no responsibility in this area.

It should be noted that FBA breeder certificates are issued on a "continuously certified" basis. Under no circumstances can the FBA transfer a certificate, unless it has been properly transferred with each change of ownership.

## Unusual Aspects

The Foundation Beefmaster Association is truly a unique breed association. Several aspects of our Certificates of Breeding are unusual:

1. No pedigree records are involved.
2. The dam and sire do not have to be certified for their offspring to be certified.
3. Only members of the FBA can obtain FBA Certificates of Breeding.
4. The member obtaining the Certificate of Breeding must have owned the subject animal continuously from birth until certification
5. An animal that is otherwise qualified may be certified at any age.
6. The animal's identification number must be a permanent mark, such as a tattoo or fire brand. Ear tags alone are not acceptable. While not required, it is strongly recommended the animal be additionally and permanently marked with breeder identification (ranch brand, holding brand, initials, etc.).

# FBA President Knows The Breed 

By Betty Jo Geiger and Amy M. Rembert

Gerry Holmes knows Beefmasters. He should - he's been a breeder since 1966. The newly elected president of the FBA, who owns Hillview Beefmasters near Falkville, Al., was the second breeder in Alabama to get Beefmaster cattle.
"I had mainly been growing Angus, but didn't like the growth rate," Holmes explained. "I was part of the original Beefmaster program. When the FBA was founded, I liked their philosophy so I went with them. I bought a bull from the Lasater Ranch in 1972.
"What fascinated me was the size of the calf at that age on the mama. We brought in a few females, started using the bulls on our Angus and noticed a significant growth increase. For several years, we had deposits on our bull calves when they were weaned. They were in good demand."

Holmes ran for director of the FBA in 1991. He served the next year as secretary, the following year as vice president and is now president of the association he has been involved with for so long.
"Our philosophy of raising good cattle and culling bad cattle is what I really appreciate. The integrity of our honest working cattle is what makes our sales so good."

Holmes commented that the two characteristics he finds especially appealing about Beefmaster cattle are their disposition and the fact that they will do well anywhere.
"Disposition is a big incentive point in the Beefmasters. I had a guy come out to see my cattle, and when he came back he said, 'These cattle aren't paying any attention to me! I walked through them and touched two or three of them, and they didn't act like there was any difference between me and you.'
"Also, Beefmaster cattle will fit anyplace ... in Florida, Colorado, Idaho, Texas. Mexico is buying a lot of our cattle, and we're also receiving inquiries from Argentina and New Zealand. Beefmaster is a versatile breed. It will work anywhere."

According to Holmes, that includes Alabama. He describes the country in which he lives as having rolling hills, an annual rainfall of 50 some inches and a good growing season. That all adds up to good grass from March until December.
"Morgan County, where I live, probably has more Beefmaster breeders than any other county in Alabama," he

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said. "They're not all FBA members, but they're Beefmaster breeders."

Hillview Beefmasters mainly sells breeding stock private treaty on the farm, with culls going to a stockyard. Holmes has never tried to feed any of his cattle out because of the state's lack of feedyards and the need to ship in a lot of corn.
"A lot of our cattle go to Kansas, the Panhandle of Texas and places like that to be fed out."

Holmes has owned his property since 1965, and said he'll always be in the cattle business. He and his wife, Linda, have four children. Their three boys have all gone to college and now work in the fields of aerospace, computer drafting and accounting. Their daughter is 13 years old and, according to Holmes, "runs the household."

Aside from his farm and his involvement with the FBA, Holmes has been very active with several other organizations. He's been president and secretary of his county cattlemen's association for several years, a state director of the Alabama Cattlemen's Association, director of the Morgan County Farmers Federation for three terms, on the county's sole conservation district committee, president of his community watch and a trustee at his church.
"My state is really active in all of the problems that we're seeing nationwide," he explained. "We've had several area beef meetings, during which we've concentrated on better beef quality, getting a more consistent product, injection-site blemishes and minimal waste.
"Feedyards have got to determine the point where they should cut off feed. If they're feeding 30 more days and ruining the product, it reflects back to our breed and it's not our fault. The cattlemen are very concerned about the product they are putting on the plate."

As far as public lands, Holmes said that is a topic that was discussed at the FBA's 1993 Convention, held in Colorado Springs, Co., in November.
"Bruce Babbitt's elimination of ranchers from the public lands doesn't affect us in Alabama, because we don't have any public lands. Everything in Alabama is privately owned, except for some forest land. But it does affect the FBA. We are definitely against any rate increases.
"Being president of the FBA is an honor to me," Holmes concluded. "It's a real organization. Anywhere you go, to an FBA member you're just like family. I can go to Missouri and see people I've never known, and they'll invite me to spend the night. And I'll do the same if they come to me." *

# A Good, Versatile Breed

Not only has J.D. Cage raised Beefmaster cattle from Colorado to the south Texas line, but he has also raised them in Central America ... Costa Rica, as a matter of fact. Cage and his son, Jay, now operate the Cage Ranch outside of Muleshoe, Tx.
"Beefmasters have become a good, versatile breed," Cage said. "They do very well because the selection of their traits was done so logically."

Cage is a former president of the Foundation Beefmaster Association, but his roots go way back in ranching and the breed. His entire family was involved in the ranch started by his grandfather near - amazingly enough - Falfurrias, Tx. Falfurrias was the original home of Tom Lasater, originator of the Beefmaster breed.
"The Lasaters were our neighbors," Cage recalled.

The Cages had looked at several breeds. They raised Herefords first, then went to an Angus/Brahman
cross and finally to a Santa Gertrudis/ Hereford cross. Cage's dad started using Beefmaster bulls in 1968 and the die was cast.

## Central American Ranching

After looking at the possibility of buying a ranch in Mexico, the Cage family took advice from Laurie Lasater of Isa Cattle Company and considered Costa Rica. They bought a ranch and lived there for nine years.
"It was a real good experience for the entire family," Cage explained. "We used native cows and Beefmaster bulls. One thing we figured out was the Beefmaster cattle acclimate anywhere.
"The government required that we sell a percentage into the local econo-

my, but we were allowed to export 60 percent. To be perfectly honest, we loved it down there but eventually had to decide what was best for the children. They were 11 and 7 at the time.
"The ranch had lots of timber and lots of water on it. The government bought it because they wanted to preserve it. They made it into a national park."

## The Cage Family Today

Fourth generation Jay now ranches with his dad and his mother, Julie. They operate land that is located south of Muleshoe, and the city of Lubbock owns the water rights. This year has been different on the ranch with only three inches of rain (normal is 17), but the gramma grass and bluestem look

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hardy and the cattle look strong and healthy.
Daughter Ali is using her fluent Spanish as an American Airlines flight attendant in the Caribbean and South America. J.D. and Julie started taking Holistic Resource Management classes in 1980, and have been practicing the program at the ranch since 1985. J.D. is a strong supporter of the program.
"We are able to run twice as many cattle since we went to the program, and we're still managing the land better," he explained. "We originally ran one cow to 35 acres on this property. Then we went to one cow to 17 acres using the HRM program, and the grass is growing and stable. Each paddock is only used 11 days a year."

Going strong, the Cages and the Beefmasters make a good team on the High Plains of Texas. *
